Do I need a Blepharoplasty?

Aside from the cosmetic reasons for getting blepharoplasty, there are other reasons to get one. If the sagging beneath your eyelids and eyebrows becomes too severe, it can impair your peripheral vision.

Sagging and drooping eyelids can also make you appear tired or inattentive, even if this isn't the case. Here are some physical ways to know if you need a blepharoplasty.

- Excessively baggy or droopy upper eyelids that are impairing your vision or making you feel self-conscious
- Extra skin above and around your eyelids is impairing your peripheral vision
- Too much skin or droopiness in your lower eyelids and they make you appear old or tired
- Self-conscious about bags under your eyes

What are the risks of Blepharoplasty?

While blepharoplasty is a relatively minor surgery, all surgeries have risks. Because the operation will focus on the area around your eyes, the risks are slightly amplified. Here are some of the possible ramifications of blepharoplasty

- Infection of the eyes or surgical site
- Dry eyes
- You may have trouble closing your eyes for a while
- Noticeable scarring unless you choose us to perform your surgery
- Slight discoloration of the skin at the surgical site
- Temporarily blurred vision or possible blindness if the surgery goes awry

What to expect during a blepharoplasty

Most blepharoplasty procedures are done in an outpatient setting where you can go home on the day of surgery. Your surgeon will make a tiny incision above or below the eye, depending on where the problem is located, and remove excess fat, skin, and muscle. Your surgeon will then close the cut, and the operation is complete.
